# Deadlines ... I always meet them

I'm going to get into the weeds of the publishing business. This may not be of interest to everyone who reads this column, but it should be relevant because it's about something everyone encounters from time to time: deadlines.



I've been in the newspaper—and now the publishing—business since my college days. Actually, even before that.

I was editor of my high school newspaper and worked on my college newspapers. My college paper was a daily, which meant I had dead-

lines pretty much every day.

While in college, I got a job at the San Diego Union as a clerk in the sports department. The job mostly involved taking calls from high school coaches and writing short articles for publication in the next morning's newspaper.

It was the perfect training ground for working on deadlines. Calls started coming in around 9 p.m., and our first deadline was 10 p.m. There wasn't much time to put together a roundup of stories.

After graduating, I went to work at my hometown newspaper and eventually became sports editor. Again, there was plenty of deadline pressure. Then I moved to Las Vegas to work in the sports department at the Las Vegas Review-Journal.

Fast forward to today, and I've worked for all kinds of publications. In all that time, I've never missed a deadline to send a newspaper to the

printer.

This publication is monthly, so by itself it's a fairly manageable deadline. But I also have deadlines for my newspaper in Mesquite, along with two others I work on in Sun City Summerlin and Sun City Anthem.

Fortunately, the deadlines for these various publications are spread throughout the month. When I finish one, I can move on to the next.

Speaking of deadlines, I have to fess up to a mistake in this issue. On the cover, I refer to Amber Messner as Amber Milholm. In the article on Page 6, her name is correct.

How come I couldn't fix it on the cover? Well, the cover section deadline was three days earlier than the inside pages because it's printed on glossy paper. By the time I noticed the error, it was too late to make the change.

# Beno's Flooring builds rep on installations

In an industry where many companies focus on selling products, Beno's Flooring has built its reputation on something else entirely — installation.

"We've installed more than 45,000 floors throughout the Las Vegas Valley," said owner Dede Beno. "Anyone can sell product. It's the installation that's most important."

That commitment to quality craftsmanship has helped Beno's Flooring grow from a home-based startup into one of Southern Nevada's most respected flooring companies.

## FROM A HOME OFFICE TO INDUSTRY RECOGNITION

Beno's Flooring began in 2001, operating out of Dede Beno's home. Before launching the company, she spent several years working for flooring businesses throughout Las Vegas, learning the trade and observing op-

portunities for improvement.

"I found better ways to run labor and crews and implemented systems that worked," Beno said. "I realized I could do better than the competition."

Determined to start her own business, Beno attended contractor school in Henderson, obtained her contractor's license and began building a client base from the ground up.

She also recruited installers she had worked with previously, creating a team she knew would uphold the company's standards.

Her first major account was a chain of five flooring stores. From there, the business continued to grow.

"I dragged my husband, who was in food and beverage at the Convention Center, to take this ride with me," she said with a laugh. "I had a mission and a vision."

The company eventually opened a warehouse and showroom in North

Las Vegas and later secured a major contract providing flooring installation services for 13 Lowe's stores.

The success led to national recognition. In 2007, Beno's Flooring was named Installer of the Year among more than 10,000 companies.

## A FOCUS ON LOCAL CUSTOMERS

After years of managing large-scale installation operations that often involved 18 to 25 jobs per day, the Benos decided to shift their focus.

The company opened its first retail location in Lake Havasu City, Arizona, where Dede grew up. In 2024, they expanded again by opening a retail showroom in northwest Las Vegas, making it easier for residents in communities like Skye Canyon, Centennial Hills and Providence to shop locally.

Today, the company maintains a slower pace while continuing to rely

on the same philosophy that fueled its growth from the beginning.

"Our installers make our company," Beno said. "Without them, we would be just another typical retail flooring store."

## WHAT'S TRENDING IN FLOORING?

While flooring styles continue to evolve, one product remains the clear favorite among homeowners.

"Luxury vinyl plank is still the leader," Beno said.

Often referred to as LVP, the product is popular because it is both water-resistant and scratch-resistant, making it a practical option for busy households.

Carpet continues to be a popular choice for bedrooms, where homeowners appreciate the warmth and comfort underfoot.

“We’re seeing an influx of tile right now,” Beno said. “But LVP is still the leader.”

### HELPING CUSTOMERS FIND THE RIGHT FIT

Unlike many retail businesses, flooring stores don’t typically attract casual shoppers.

“Let’s face it, customers don’t come to a flooring store to browse,” Beno said.

Most customers arrive with a project already in mind, whether it’s replacing flooring, renovating a shower or creating a custom floor-to-ceiling fireplace feature.

The Beno’s Flooring team starts by learning about the customer’s lifestyle.

Do they have small children? Pets? Teenagers riding hoverboards through the house? Or are they empty nesters looking for something elegant and durable?

By understanding how a family uses its home, the staff can recommend products that fit both lifestyle and budget.

Customers are encouraged to take flooring samples home to see how they look alongside their paint colors, furniture and lighting conditions.

“Flooring looks different during the day and at night,” Beno said.

Once customers narrow their selection, the company schedules a free measurement using laser technology and iPads to ensure accuracy. The final estimate is then built around the customer’s preferred product.

### STANDING BEHIND EVERY INSTALLATION

For Beno, the difference between a good flooring project and a great one comes down to the details.

The company is fully licensed, bonded and insured, and every installation is inspected both during and after completion.

“We guide customers from the minute they walk through the door, through the purchase and installation process,” Beno said. “All of our installations are inspected during and after the job is done, ensuring customers are 100 percent happy.”

That attention to detail has earned Beno’s Flooring a loyal customer base and a reputation built over more than two decades.

As the Las Vegas Valley continues to grow, Beno hopes residents will remember the value of supporting local businesses.

“We care and give our customers the best possible experience,” she said. “We urge Las Vegans to shop locally.”



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# Creativity finds a home at Millholm43

After more than 20 years as a school psychologist, Amber Messner decided it was time to exercise a different part of her brain.

"I work full time as a school psychologist and have used the left side of my brain for over 20 years," she said. "It was time to scratch the itch of the right side of my brain and let my creativity have a moment."

That creative outlet became Millholm43, a custom gift box and gift basket business that she launched in 2025. What began as a passion for thoughtful gift-giving has grown into a business that allows her to create personalized gifts while supporting local makers and small businesses.

Messner admits she had no experience running a business before starting Millholm43.

"I had zero previous background in owning a business," she said.

What she did have was a knack for creating meaningful gifts.

"I do have a personal creative flex when it comes to custom gift giving," she said. "It's something I genuinely enjoy doing."

That passion comes through in every order. Messner works closely with clients to learn about the recipient, then curates gifts designed to reflect their personality and interests.

"When a client tells me all the wonderful things about someone they want to give a gift to, and trusts me to curate something that will wow them and make them feel special, it's the absolute best," she said.

One recent project involved creating 35 gift boxes for a teacher appreciation event. The response confirmed she was on the right path.

"I had them displayed on a table, and when the principal walked in, she audibly gasped and smiled so brightly," Messner said. "Moments like these are exactly why I'll keep doing this."

The business name itself has roots in the Skye Canyon community. Millholm43 is named after the street where the business was founded,



while the number 43 symbolizes discipline and creativity.

Those roots run deep. Messner and her husband moved to Las Vegas from Minnesota a decade ago and built their home in Skye Canyon four years ago.

"People said, 'You're going to move all the way up there?'" she recalled.

Today, she says it was one of the best decisions they ever made.

"It's beautiful here. The people are great. The amount of parks, trails and activities is perfect. And it's amazingly quiet at night for the amount of energy the community has during the day."

Supporting fellow small-business owners is an important part of Millholm43's mission. Whenever possible, she sources products locally and

actively promotes the businesses she works with.

"My network of local makers is continually growing, and that's something I am proud of," she said.

Whether partnering with vendors at community markets or incorporating locally made products into gift boxes, she makes sure customers know where those products come from.

"I'm also a big advocate of buying from small businesses, both local and nationwide," she said.

One of her favorite custom projects involved creating a retirement gift for a woman who had played a significant role in a colleague's career. After hearing stories about the retiree and the impact she had made, Messner carefully selected items that reflected her personality

and interests.

The finished gift included candles, wax melts, chocolate, tea, a monogrammed mug and spa-themed items such as bath salts, lotions and eye masks. Everything was arranged in a reusable basket accented with flowers, ribbon and a handwritten note.

"He wanted the sun, moon and stars in that gift basket," Messner said. "And rightfully so."

As a new business owner, Messner has focused on networking and building relationships throughout the community. She participates in local markets and events and plans to continue expanding her online presence through social media and her website.

# Brune wins Ward 6 primary, secures re-election

Incumbent Ward 6 City Councilwoman Nancy Brune has secured another term on the Las Vegas City Council after winning the June primary election with 57 percent of the vote.



Because Las Vegas City Council races are nonpartisan, candidates who receive more than 50 percent of the vote in the primary election are declared the winner and avoid a general election runoff in November.

Brune celebrated the victory in a message to supporters shortly after the results became official.

"The votes are in," Brune said. "I'm

elated to share that Team Brune won the primary with 57 percent of the vote."

Brune credited her campaign team, supporters and volunteers for helping secure the victory. She specifically thanked campaign manager Dennis Walters, who accurately predicted the campaign's winning percentage.

"I'm honored to have earned the confidence and trust of the voters of Ward 6," Brune said. "I'm grateful to all of the volunteers and supporters — near and far — who stood with us by knocking doors, making calls, telling a friend, posting signs, helping with material designs, opening their pocketbooks and lighting their prayer candles."

Throughout her campaign, Brune emphasized community engagement, neighborhood connections and a positive campaign message.

She said voters responded to her

record of service during her first term.

"I'm especially grateful to the voters of Ward 6," she said. "Thank you for seeing us — seeing the work we've done consistently over the past four years to build connection and community, and for affirming our commitment to run a positive campaign rooted in our values and faith and informed by servant leadership."

Brune was first elected to represent Ward 6 in 2022. The ward includes portions of northwest Las Vegas, including communities such as Skye Canyon, Centennial Hills and Providence.

With her majority victory in the primary, Brune's campaign is officially complete.

She will not appear on the Nov. 3 general election ballot and is scheduled to be sworn in for her next term on July 1.

to produce a development agreement that would come before the City Council at a future public meeting," a city spokesman said.

The ice center, planned along Deer Springs Way, could one day be a cornerstone for a larger sports complex.

And speaking of rinks, one serving the northwest has been put on ice — and not in a good way.

Equipment failure this spring forced closure of the Hylo Park Ice Arena in North Las Vegas, part of a 73-acre mixed-use project being developed on the former Texas Station and Fiesta Rancho casino sites at Lake Mead Boulevard and Rancho Drive.

The rink, a holdover from the casino days, is expected to remain closed for 12 to 14 months while developer Agora Realty & Management replaces the ice-making system, expands capacity to about 2,500 bleacher seats and makes other upgrades.

**DUSK GATHERING:** The season's bounty awaits when the summer sun starts to set and Las Vegas emerge from their air-conditioned cocoons. Fresh52 Farmers Market has moved its weekly Skye Canyon event to summer hours, bringing produce, artisan goods and community vibes to Skye Canyon Park Thursdays from 4 to 8 p.m. More information at fresh52.vcom
